

Role models don't come any better in professional football than this long-serving one-club man. A knee injury shortly after his appointment as club captain in 1992 put him out of the game for over two years, and then he got badly hurt again, but recovered to continue one of the great Watford careers. Nigel Gibbs made his senior début in a UEFA Cup tie two days after becoming a professional, and he came to monopolize the right-back position, making more Football League appearances for the club than anyone else but Luther Blissett and Duncan Welbourne, and in all first-team competitions more than anyone except Blissett. But for the injuries he would very probably have gone on to set appearance records far in advance of everyone else. Although rarely among the goals, he once scored in both legs of a Football League Cup tie against Darlington.







A sprightly winger who served the club well for two seasons, and much more satisfactory than some of the Vialli signings, Stephen Glass represented his country at four levels, his one Full cap coming in his Premier League days with Newcastle United. 

Formerly a London bobby during the Second World War, Jimmy Gooch became a Preston North End professional for eleven years, keeping goal in 157 peacetime Football League games in the top two divisions. 

Micky Good became the licensee of a Brighton pub, *The Flowing Tide*, and later lost his sight.

(On 5 Dec 1892, in Templemore, Co Tipperary, Good enlisted as a gunner in the Royal Artillery, and two months later he transferred to the Royal Horse Artillery. On 23 Sep 1893 he deserted from Woolwich. Subsequent to this he took upon a range of bogus personal "facts" – his birthplace, his father's name, etc – which was very possibly intended to keep the army from identifying him as the deserter whose correct personal details are on his army attestation papers. He even bamboozled his own descendents, who right until their own deaths were never aware of the true facts.)



Watford could have had no more distinguished figure as their first manager than this great inside-forward. John Goodall captained England, won 14 caps, and was the Football League's top-scorer in its first season, when he helped Preston North End to the League-and-Cup double. He also played first-class cricket, represented England at bowls, and was an excellent billiards player and a prize-winning cage-bird fancier. Forty-years-old when he arrived at Cassio Road, he nevertheless continued as a player. At 44 he became (and remains) the oldest man to have made a competitive first-team appearance for the club in peacetime, and he actually turned out occasionally in the Southern League for Mardy until as late as 1913. His impact at Watford was immediate, the championship of the Southern League's Second Division being won with spectacular ease. In February 1907 he played alongside his son Dick in a reserve-team match away to Chelsea in the South Eastern League, in which Dick scored in a 2-4 defeat. 'Johnny Allgood' (a sobriquet his distinction earned him) had a cage-bird shop in Watford, and after leaving the game in 1913 returned to live in the town for the rest of his life, which included a spell as groundsman at West Herts Sports Ground. Although London-born, the son of an army corporal, he spoke with a Scottish accent, being of Scottish parents and having moved to Kilmarnock in infancy. An oddity of his Deepdale days was that in Preston North End's all-time-record FA Cup win – 26-0 against Hyde United – he scored only once. His Belfast-born brother Archie represented Ireland at football.

Ted Goodier was a well-built veteran half-back who was picked at centre-half for the opening game of the 1935/36 season (which Bristol City won 2-0 at Vicarage Road) but wasn't seen again in a first-team shirt. Although acting as caretaker-manager of Birmingham for a time during the Second World War, he was officially Rochdale's manager for 14 years from 1938 and led that club to victory in the Lancashire Senior Cup in 1949. 





When he joined Watford he'd gone 18 games without a goal for Carlisle United, but the signing proved a highly astute one. The first of Danny Graham's two Vicarage Road seasons was a good one, and the second brought him the club's highest individual goal tally for 28 years. He began it by becoming only the second player in the club's history to have scored twice in each of four consecutive matches, and later enjoyed two scoring sequences of seven games and six games, respectively. More than just a goalscorer, he impressed with his all-round game, the result of which was a transfer into the big-time with Premier League newcomers Swansea City. At the higher level he generally found goalscoring a lot more difficult.

A crafty inside-forward with an excellent career total of 121 Football League goals, Les Graham signed for Blackburn Rovers while he was representing the army in India. 

A talented forward but an eccentrically difficult character ("raving mad" was a popular view) who changed clubs with remarkable regularity after making his French League début in the 3rd Division with Pau, and became known as "Doctor Death" in the Watford changing-room during his very brief flirtation with English football. Deprived of a decent playing career – first by the Second World War, and then by injury which left him finished at 26 – Ron Gray was to become the youngest of all Watford managers. He was the youngest to depart, too, for the club had to seek reelection to the League at the end of his only full season in charge, and that was that. 

Signed while on National Service, he replaced Freddie Bunce in the outside-left position in the 1959/60 promotion run-in. He subsequently adapted to a half-back role, but it was on the wing that Tony Gregory had been capped at youth level when with Vauxhall Motors and played in Luton Town's FA Cup Final side in 1959. 

One of four sons of a Pinner farmer who were on Watford's books, three of them professionals, Fred Gregory was versatile and highly respected, latterly as a left-back. After his sixteen seasons on the staff, including three as captain, he played occasionally for the Reserves and ran a pub, *The Victory*, in historic premises in Pinner High Street, until his death. He scored the goal which clinched a 3-2 win at Gillingham, and with it the 1914/15 Southern League championship.







Born on St Valentine's Day – hence the Christian name – as the son of a Pinner farmer, and brother of Fred and two other footballers on Watford's books, Val Gregory served the club mainly as a strong, hard right-half, and was selected to represent the Southern League on five occasions. His transfer fee was easily a club record, and George Edmonds moved to Molineux with him for an identical amount. They both played for Wolves in the 1921 FA Cup Final, in which Gregory and Arthur Grimsdell were the opposing captains.









The four Gregory brothers were all born within less than five years of each other. From left (eldest) to right (youngest): Fred, Val, Allen and Owen. The two eldest were distinguished Watford players. Of the younger pair, Allen spent the 1920-21 season as a professional on the club's books without making a first-team appearance, and Owen was an amateur who played frequently for the club during the First World War (26 appearances, 1 goal).
